A Mandate From Voters?

THIS MONTH'S MEETING

Our topic for this month's luncheon at **12 noon on Tuesday, January 5, 2015** at the Wyndham Garden Hotel on E. 70th Street will be **State Representative Alan Seabaugh** who will offer insight and commentary on the tug-of-war between the Governor-elect and Republicans in the House, regarding who should be the next Speaker of the House.

In an article appearing in the *The Advocate*, Louisiana Democrats say they recognize that Governor-elect John Bel Edwards had the perfect "three-legged stool" to boost his campaign from a potential afterthought in 2015, to winning the race outright. "We've gotten pretty darn good at not only ID'ing who the voters are we need to have contact with, but also how to have those conversations," said Louisiana Democratic Party Executive Director Stephen Handwerk.

PEC & SCC QUALIFYING COMPLETE

Qualifying for the March 5, 2016 election of the Republican Parish Executive Committee members and the Republican State Central Committee members was held December 2-4. The Caddo Republican Executive Committee (PEC) consists of 12 district members and 5 at-large members. The Caddo delegation to the State Central Committee (SCC) consists of 13 districts, which are subdivisions of the State Senate districts.

Of the 17 positions available on the Caddo PEC, candidates qualified for 14, leaving 3 districts vacant. In 13 of the PEC districts, candidates who qualified had no opposition and will be sworn in officially in March. They are: Nancy Adcock, Jim Allen, Harold Coates, Micheal Collins, Michael Johnson, Matt Kay, Creighton Light, Betsy Malone, Scott Morse, Jim Taliaferro, Barry Rachal, Matt Varnell, and Jake Woods. Two (2) candidates qualified for the 8th district: Louis R. Avallone and Martha Belchic.

Of the 13 positions on the SCC, candidates qualified for 12 seats, leaving only 1 vacancy. In 10 of the seats, candidates who qualified

had no opposition and will be sworn in officially in March. In 2 of the SCC seats, 2 candidates qualified for those seats. Those candidates who were unopposed for the SCC seats are: Louis R. Avallone, Harold Coates, Matt Kay, Kris Lucas, Sandy McDade, Scott Morse, Ronnie Remedies, Dhu Thompson, Matt Varnell, and Jake Woods. Jim Allen and Martha Belchic both qualified in the District 37C seat, and Richie Burford and Ed Lazarus qualified in the District 38D seat.

The election of the contested seats will be March 5, 2016, which is the same date as the Louisiana presidential preference election. After this election, all candidates elected to the PEC will be sworn in at the Caddo Courthouse, at a time to be determined. All candidates elected to the SCC will be sworn in at the first meeting of the Committee, which is Saturday March 19, in Baton Rouge.

THE HISTORY OF NEW ORLEANS

Democrat Mayor Mitch Landrieu is removing large chunks of the very history that so many millions of tourists have traveled to New Orleans to see. The *New Orleans Advocate* reported earlier in December that four (4) statues will be removed in New Orleans, destined for storage in a warehouse, because the City Council deemed them "offensive". They include the statues of Gen. Robert E. Lee in Lee Circle, Confederate President Jefferson Davis on Jefferson Davis Parkway and Gen. P.G.T. Beauregard at the entrance to City Park, plus a monument on Iberville Street near the river honoring the so-called Battle of Liberty Place, an 1874 rebellion against the state's biracial Reconstruction-era government by a group of former Confederates seeking to restore white "home rule." The 6-1 vote and Landrieu's quick signature mean all four are destined for a city warehouse, possibly within days, although monument supporters quickly filed a lawsuit in federal court to try to stop that.
